Staff Overview

Legislative Update

The Legislature adjourned on September 12th. The last day for the Governor to sign or veto bills was October 12th. Several of the bills the First 5 Association supported were held back.

Signed Bills

AB 607 (Rodriguez) extends the enrollment timeframe for the CalWORKs Home Visiting Program (HVP) and allows families to participate longer, based on model duration. The law strengthens the CalWORKs Home Visiting Program while maintaining cost neutrality.

AB 753 (Garcia) strengthens the early childhood workforce and expand access to high-quality child care for families. Two of the bill's sponsors are Child Action, Inc. and the Child Care Resource Center (CCRC).

AB 563 (Jackson) enhances the oversight and effectiveness of the Early Childhood Policy Council (ECPC). The council advises on planning, implementation, and evaluation of California's Master Plan for Early Learning and Care, ensuring equitable access to early education services for diverse populations.

Members are appointed by the Governor, the Senate, the Assembly, and the State Superintendent of Public Instruction. The council includes representatives from government agencies, childcare providers, advocacy organizations, school districts, and First 5 commissions, as well as a Parent Advisory Committee and a Workforce Advisory Committee.

SB 271 (Gómez Reyes) increases campus collaboration and child care support for parenting students at California's public higher education institutions.

Parent Leadership Training Institute (PLTI) Recruitment

While the standby guardian has the duties and powers of a guardian while provisionally appointed and upon formal appointment, the rights of the custodial parent remain superior to the rights of the standby guardian - an important provision to simplify reunification.
